

SUNDAY MASS PARKING



How the Events of Life Change Us Heading

This weekend the Rugby World Cup begins - the event that we have talked and heard about for the past few years. The stadiums are ready, the fans have arrived and by the time you read this the Opening Ceremony would have taken place and the first games played. The next six weeks will be either fascinating or frustrating depending on whether you love or are ambivalent about the 'game' of rugby.

However, today we also remember the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Centre in New York. This was a life changing event for our world and for those directly affected by the tragic events of that day. In light of today's Gospel I thought I would share this story of survival, love and forgiveness.

John Paul DeVito was on the 87th floor of the North Tower when the plane struck on September 11, 2001. While many see the day of the attacks in a negative light, DeVito is able to see what happened as positive. His heart aches for the thousands of men and women who lost their lives, including one man from his office who didn't make it down the 87 flights of stairs. However, as DeVito descended the stairs, he says he found hope.

DeVito explained: "What I experienced that day was the beauty of the world, not the evil of the world". He saw people helping strangers. He saw people passing out water. In fact, DeVito did both himself.

So, when people speak about how the day was the worst in human history, he says it was the best.

DeVito said: "What individuals did that day, what firemen did that day, what police and emergency workers did that day, it just overwhelms me". It took DeVito 50 minutes to make it to the first floor. As soon as he got there, the South Tower fell. He ran in the other direction.

DeVito isn't planning anything out of the ordinary for the 10th anniversary of September 11. He plans to go to church and on a walk with his wife. He said: "Each and every day is a special gift.

Reflection: "Playing Fair"



Social Justice Week is set by the New Zealand Catholic Bishops Conference each year as an opportunity for the whole Church to consider our Catholic social teaching on a particular social justice issue facing our society. In 2011, the theme is "On a level playing field: Fair play and the common good".

As the Rugby World Cup begins, we want to see players and teams strive to do their best. We want to enjoy the competition, knowing that it will be a fair one: that there are rules set, that there are referees to enforce the rules, and that players will be playing on "a level playing field" rather than one where one side has an advantage because of the slope of the field.

Many people also use this phrase 'on a level playing field' and other sporting metaphors to talk about issues of fairness and equality in our society. A level playing field doesn't mean that everyone has to be treated absolutely the same way, but it does imply that everyone is given a fair go. In Catholic terms, looking out for the good of everyone is called working for the common good.

Today's Gospel reading of the account of the servant whose debt was forgiven but refused to treat another in the same way is a story of unfair treatment. The anger of the fellow servants is an example for us of protesting when we see our neighbours being unfairly treated. The Gospel reminds us that God has already forgiven us and given us more than we could ever repay. Our sense of justice towards other people comes out of the justice that God shows us.

In Catholic social teaching, the importance of creating a society which is fair for all of us, and not just for some people or groups of people, is summed up in the concept of the common good.
