The Widow and the Judge

The "agenda" for today's Mass is the Gospel.

Without further delay, see if you can read it through thoughtfully before Mass begins. You'll be more tuned in and get more out of the priest's homily.....

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town,' he said, 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for anyone. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for anybody, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights or she will persist in coming and worry me to death." '

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now, will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?' (Luke 18:1-8)

What struck you? Was there anything strange or worth noting? The Holy Spirit often speaks via those ideas.

Here are a few background details.

- 1) The judge only gets busy when his safety is at risk 'worry me to death' in the original Greek comes from the boxing arena and literally means 'give me a black eye.' Truly.
- 2) The story is comical and might refer to a story at the time where a desperate widow threw a punch in order to have her court case taken seriously. (I did not make this up! It's in one of the commentaries.)
- 3) A widow had no leverage in society. She depended on the law alone. This widow had no husband and probably no sons to back her in a man's world against corrupt or lazy officials.
- 4) So it's a warning to those whose actions or inertia allow the world to be a hostile place for the poor. They will have to reckon with God who is a God of Justice.
- 5) And it's encouragement to all of us to have faith in God, to persevere in prayer asking God without ceasing (each morning and night is our minimum) "Thy Kingdom come."

October, The Extraordinary Month of Mission



Pope Francis has called October the Extraordinary Month of Mission.

The logo is full of meaning: The Missionary cross → Five continents, Transparent world → Gospel has no boundaries,

Colourful cross \rightarrow Resurrection, Baptised & sent \rightarrow Basic identity of a Christian: Baptism & proclamation.

Father Bernard Espiritu of Missio-NZ asked Catholic Discovery, the Catholic Enquiry Centre's online resource, to find a story of New Zealand volunteers working abroad. Father Frank Bird SM is the Director of the Marist Asia Foundation and both he and Katie Fisher are volunteer teachers at a Marist school in Ranong, a fishing town in southern Thailand on the border with Burma/Myanmar. The town has many Burmese migrant worker families whose children can attend the school from pre-school right through to university level, the latter online via Australian Catholic University.

The children can struggle in Thai schools if they lack Thai language skills. The secondary schooling they receive is particularly crucial for migrant children who might otherwise be required by parents to find jobs because of economic pressures.

"I've seen in front of my own eyes the young girls jumping up with joy and dancing round the room because they can go to school," says Father Frank. "They've got a future, and I get the benefit as a missionary seeing that every week." Adds Katie: "If it wasn't for us, most of the children would leave school at age 12."

The children mainly come from a Buddhist background, which is respected by the school. Father Frank hopes students witness and benefit from the joyful loving presence of a Catholic community. The work he and Katie do is having a big impact on the community. It's not just education they are offering, but also pride, dignity and better futures.

Saint John Henry Newman (1801-1890) An architect of the modern Church

On Sunday at St Peter's Square, the Vatican, Pope Francis canonised John Henry Newman.


The one-time Oxford University don remains one of the Christian world's best-known philosophers and theologians, and is also remembered for his poetry, hymns, sermons and novels. He was loved in his lifetime not because people had read his intellectual masterpieces, for which he later became famous, but because he was a deeply pastoral figure who showed kindness to the poor, unemployed and sick.

While teaching at Oxford University, he served as an Anglican priest. During these years he co-led the Oxford Movement, which sought to rid the Church of England of state interference and revive its pre-Reformation beliefs and rituals.

In 1845, having concluded the Anglican via media, or middle way, between Protestantism and Roman Catholicism was a sham, Newman joined the Catholic Church, founding the oratory and helping set up a Catholic university in Ireland three years later.

Having been influential in Catholicism's revival in England after three centuries' repression and restriction, he was appointed a cardinal by Pope Leo XIII in 1879, and his thinking on church history, ecclesiology, the rights of conscience and role of laypeople is widely believed to have anticipated the 1962-65 Second Vatican Council.
