3 May 2020, 4th Sunday of Easter

The Shepherd and the Lamb

Here is the Gospel reading for this Sunday – it's the 'agenda' at all the Masses throughout the world today. You might wonder how it got into our Easter readings. There is no resurrection story here...

Jesus said: I tell you most solemnly, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold through the gate but gets in some other way is a thief and a brigand. The one who enters through the gate is the shepherd of the flock; the gatekeeper lets him in, the sheep hear his voice, one by one he calls his own sheep and leads them out. When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice. They never follow a stranger but run away from him: they do not recognise the voice of strangers.'

Jesus told them this parable, but they failed to understand what he meant by telling it to them. So, Jesus spoke to them again:

I tell you most solemnly, I am the gate of the sheepfold.

All others who have come are thieves and brigands;

but the sheep took no notice of them.

I am the gate.

Anyone who enters through me will be safe:

he will go freely in and out and be sure of finding pasture.

The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy.

I have come so that they may have life and have it to the full. (John: 1-10)

A few observations:

- 1) Jesus calls himself the Gate. He is the point of entry into the sheepfold which is a safe place at night. Literally they enter 'to be saved'.
- 2) But at dawn it is through the gate that they must go out to pasture. The Gate (Jesus) gives entry to what is life-protecting but also life-sustaining. The pasture is highlighted in the Psalm of the day: 'Fresh and green are the pastures where he gives me repose...' We can read the sacraments here
- 3) The image of a good shepherd is deeply Jewish. David, the shepherd boy was the model good king. The leaders of Israel were 'shepherds' who alternatively tended or abused God's 'flock' entrusted to them.
- 4) In real life, yes a shepherd would drive off wolves. Sometimes while beating off one he might be attacked by the pack and killed. He defended the flock more for fear of his master or other debts he would incur than for love of the animals. In real life, the sheep were for killing and eating. The poetic image or metaphor was not extended so far as to include this harsh truth. To feed his family, the shepherd might be justly paid with a sheep or he might steal one himself and blame a wolf attack.
- 5) Yet this is not the shepherd that Jesus is. For the sheep he gives his life.
- 6) In the logic of this image now, Jesus is also called the Lamb the Lamb who is killed and so prevents the Death of them all. He becomes Food to sustain the people. This Lamb offers himself knowingly for love, that they may be saved. The Lamb of Sacrifice is also a central image from the Jewish scriptures.
- 7) All of which brings us back to my first question. The Shepherd is also the Lamb of Easter.

Sunday's Readings—4th Sunday of Easter

THEY KNOW HIS VOICE. At times it can be hard to recognise the voice of Jesus as there are many who claim to speak in his name. A useful guide is to look at people's actions. We can listen to those whose lives reveal the qualities of Jesus: love, compassion, justice, self-sacrifice. They are the good shepherds in our midst.

First Reading

Acts 2:14, 36-41

On the day of Pentecost Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd in a loud voice: 'The whole House of Israel can be certain that God has made this Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Christ.'

Hearing this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and the apostles, 'What must we do, brothers?' You must repent,' Peter answered 'and every one of you must be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise that was made is for you and your children, and for all those who are far away, for all those whom the Lord our God will call to himself.' He spoke to them for a long time using many arguments, and he urged them, 'Save yourselves from this perverse generation.' They were convinced by his arguments, and they accepted what he said and were baptised. That very day about three thousand were added to their number.

R. The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want.

Fresh and green are the pastures where he gives me repose. Near restful waters he leads me, to revive my drooping spirit. R He guides me along the right path; he is true to his name. R You have prepared a banquet for me in the sight of my foes. My head you have anointed with oil; my cup is overflowing. R Surely goodness and kindness shall follow me all the days of my life. In the Lord's own house shall I dwell for ever and ever. R

Second Reading

1 Peter 2:20-25

The merit, in the sight of God, is in bearing punishment patiently when you are punished after doing your duty. This, in fact, is what you were called to do, because Christ suffered for you and left an example for you to follow the way he took. He had not done anything wrong, and there had been no perjury in his mouth. He was insulted and did not retaliate with insults; when he was tortured he made no threats but he put his trust in the righteous judge. He was bearing our faults in his own body on the cross, so that we might die to our faults and live for holiness; through his wounds you have been healed. You had gone astray like sheep but now you have come back to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

John 10:1-10
