24 May 2020, The Ascension of the Lord

The Ascension of Our Lord into Heaven

Here's the First Reading for today's feast:

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and I taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth'.

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.' (Acts of the Apostles 1:1-11)

A few observations:

- This is the very beginning of the Acts of the Apostles which is addressed to "Theophilus." This Greek name suggests a non-Jewish reader and therefore a convert. It means "lover of God" and could be a particular person or more likely one representative of the new Christian community. The "earlier work" referred to is St Luke's Gospel which is also addressed to "Theophilus" - making Acts a sequel to that Gospel.
- The last paragraph describes today's feast the Ascension. The cloud takes and 2) receives Jesus – the reverse of how it is promised he will return in the future "on the clouds of heaven" (Lk 21:27). The cloud indicates the presence of Yahweh think back to the clouds and thunder over Mt Sinai when Moses received the commandments or the cloud that hung over Jesus' baptism or his transfiguration. Jesus is there enthroned at God's right hand. In truth Jesus is one with God.
- 3) The two men who speak recall the two with Jesus at the transfiguration and more recently the two (angels?) at the tomb who also provided commentary to the puzzled disciples. All these moments are theophanies – moments where the transcendent divinity of Jesus breaks through the disciples' ordinary human experience of Jesus.
- The question about looking up is a reproach: the disciples have already been told 4) to prepare for the coming of the Holy Spirit who would empower them to move out to ends of the earth as Jesus' witnesses. There is no reason to look at the sky.

Sunday's Readings - The Ascension of the Lord

I AM WITH YOU ALWAYS. When Christ ascended into heaven he did not abandon his disciples. Matthew's Gospel begins with the angel's words that Jesus will be called Emmanuel, which means God-is-with-us, and it ends with Jesus' promise: 'Know that I am with you always, yes, to the end of time.' In a special way Emmanuel is with us in this Eucharist for 'where two or three are gathered in my name, I shall be there with them.'

First Reading Acts 1:1-11

May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a spirit of wisdom and perception of what is revealed, to bring you to full knowledge of him. May he enlighten the eyes of your mind so that you can see what hope his call holds for you, what rich glories he has promised the saints will inherit and how infinitely great is the power that he has exercised for us believers. This you can tell from the strength of his power at work in Christ, when he used it to raise him from the dead and to make him sit at his right hand, in heaven, far above every Sovereignty, Authority, Power, or Domination, or any other name that can be named not only in this age but also in the age to come. He has put all things under his feet and made him, as the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.

Gospel Matthew 28:16-20

The eleven disciples set out for Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had arranged to meet them. When they saw him they fell down before him, though some hesitated. Jesus came up and spoke to them. He said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, make disciples of all the nations; baptise them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teach them to observe all the commands I gave you. And know that I am with you always; yes, to the end of time.'
