10 July 2022, 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

A few years ago, Pope Francis used our Sunday's Gospel of the 'Good Samaritan' as the basis for a pastoral letter on the care for the terminally ill. The Pope's letter has taken on practical relevance in our own country with euthanasia and assisted suicide now legal possibilities.

In the Gospel, a priest and Levite both pass by a severely wounded man. In Jesus' time these men were religious representatives of the wider Jewish culture. Precisely, those who *should* have cared for the wounded and vulnerable man are the ones who distance themselves. This speaks of a deeper problem than the individual moral failure of the priest and Levite. In the same way, New Zealand's 'End of Life Choice Act' is only the tip of the iceberg; underpinning our legislation is a wider ethical and cultural sickness.

I have often wondered if the wounded man was conscious enough to reflect on the behaviour of the priest and Levite. He may have condemned their actions (rightly) and augmented his physical suffering with loneliness and bitterness. He may have forgiven them and found peace. Or perhaps he may have thought to himself: "If the ones who should love me deem my life unimportant, then perhaps it isn't?" Perhaps the wounded man sees the priest and Levite prioritising quality of life, reputation, and financial security over any sense of the God-given dignity of life and agrees with them. It would not be surprising if the wounded man searches for a way to hide the shame of being alive, to hasten his death in some way.

It is a basic human truth that beyond our most fundamental needs, our desires are mediated and imitative. We learn what to want by looking at what others want, particularly those we trust such as role models, family, and friends. For this reason, the temptations of euthanasia and assisted suicide can arise in the context of such relationships. If such people consider temporal things as more important (even in an unspoken way), then those things must be more important. If we resent the time taken up by a dying person or show undue preoccupation with the financial cost of treatment, we become like the priest and Levite. I wonder how many times the cry "I want to end my life" is the reflection of a hundred little moments of others saying: "I wish you were dead." If we hear it and see it enough times, we may start to believe it.

Pope Francis rightly saw the Christ-like love of the good Samaritan as emblematic in our approach to our wounded and suffering neighbour.

The Good Samaritan, who puts the face of his brother in difficulty at the centre of his heart, and sees his need, offers him whatever is required to repair his wound of desolation and to open his heart to the luminous beams of hope.

These 'luminous beams of hope' are nothing other than belief that life is precious because God made us and wants to bring us to Himself. Let us take up the opportunities to show care, love, and patience to our wounded brothers and sisters, so that may they have hope in God's love for them too.
